HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF OUR FOUNDER ST. IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA

Saint Ignatius was born in 1491 in the ancestral castle at Loyola which was loyal to the Spanish crown. He was raised to be a courtier. In 1521 when Ignatius was trying to defend the fortress town of Pamplona, he was very badly wounded in his leg. While he recuperated, he read the books on the Life of Christ and Lives of the Saints. He underwent a conversion of heart and decided to lay aside the “sword of war” and took up the “sword of Christ”.

In 1537, he was ordained in Venice. He founded the Society of Jesus in 1540 in Rome with six of his companions with whom he dedicated himself to the greater glory of God and the good of humanity. Together, they placed themselves at the Service of the Pope who could send them whenever and wherever there was a need.

He contributed greatly to the Catholic revival in the sixteenth century and to the renewal of the Church’s missionary activities. He died in Rome in 1556 and was canonized by Gregory XV in 1622.

IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY

Ignatian spirituality explained in the Spiritual Exercises written by St Ignatius is a tool that guides us to realize a meaningful journey of life. It is a set of values, attitudes and insights and not hard and fast rules on how to pray. The central theme is that God is present everywhere every person and everything in all moments of life. What is more important is discerning His presence in the routine of ordinary life and adding deeper value to our experiences. And the value addition is gained when we become “men and women for others”.

SOCIETY OF JESUS

The Society of Jesus (in Latin: Societatis Iesu) is a Christian Religious Congregation of the Catholic Church whose members are called Jesuits. The term Jesuit is an anglicized version of the Latin Jesuit and it is the combination of the two latin words Jesu and Ita which means “Yes, Jesus”.

The names of the members of the Society of Jesus are affixed with an abbreviation, ‘SJ’ whose meaning is ‘Society of Jesus’.

The Portuguese, who had political control over certain regions in the Indian sub-continent from 16th Century, supported the Catholic Church and the Jesuit Mission in many respects. Due to political and ideological conflicts in

Europe, on 21st July 1773, the Society of Jesus was suppressed by Pope Clement XVI. But after 41 years, Pope Pius VII restored the Society of Jesus in 1814 and the Jesuit order was re-established throughout the world.

Today, there are more than 16,000 Jesuits serving in 112 countries 180 Jesuits are working at social action centres, schools and colleges in Jesuit Chennai Province. The Jesuits are well-known for their social involvement through educational, pastoral service with fervent focus on social justice and human rights.

OUR MISSION

“One mission, many ministries”, is the popular maxim about the Jesuits’ Mission through out the world. In the beginning, the Jesuits were sent as missionaries to the Asian, African and American continents. Today, the Jesuits are the best known for their colleges, universities, and high schools. With the spirit of a fierce spanish soldier, St. Ignatius instructed the early Jesuits to go out and “find God in all things”. Nothing binds their endeavour and passion. They are propelled to commit themselves in anything “For the Greater Glory of God” (*Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam*).

Pope Benedict XVI emphasizes this commitment in his message to the 35th General Congregation of Jesuits. “The Church needs you, counts on you, and continues to turn to you with confidence, particularly to reach the geographical and spiritual places where others do not reach or find it difficult to reach.”

STRUCTURE

The Society of Jesus is spread all over the world. The headquarter lies in Rome, known as Curia Generalis which is headed by Fr Superior General. There are ten ‘Assistancies’ which are known as regions that might include a continent or a part of a continent. Each Assistancy is made up of territories called ‘Provinces’. There are 83 Jesuit provinces around the world. Each Province is headed by a ‘Provincial’ who reports directly to the Curia.

JESUIT CHENNAI PROVINCE

Jesuit presence in the land of Tamils began since the time of St. Francis Xavier on his arrival in Goa on 6 May, 1542. When Robert De Nobili, a saintly scholar, visited the southern city of Madurai in 1606, he founded a mission which he called it the Madura Mission. After Nobili, the Jesuits worked in the Madura Mission till 1759. When Pope Clement XIV suppressed the Society of Jesus on 21 July 1773, the Jesuits ceased to exist openly and officially anywhere.

The Society of Jesus was re-established on 7th August 1814 by Pope Pius VII. Fr. Roothan, General of the Society of Jesus, entrusted the Madura Mission - the new Madura Mission- to the Provincial of France, Fr. Francis Renault.

Therefore, the two Madura Missions - the 'Old Madura Mission' (1606-1773) run by the Portuguese Jesuits (before the suppression) and the 'New Madura Mission' (1837-1952) by the French Jesuits of the Society became eventually the Madurai Province in 1953. With effect from 15th of August 1952, an Independent Jesuit Madurai Mission came into existence. It was the First Independent Mission of the new society in Asia.

The Northern region of the Jesuit Madurai Province in Tamil Nadu State was officially created as the Jesuit Chennai Mission in June 2007 in order to strengthen and enhance the mission. In fact, it was launched in 1990 to empower the marginalized, especially the rural poor and the Dalits, considered and treated as untouchables in the society. The objective was wholistic development of people with human dignity and economic stability. This will pave the way for social equality so that the oppressed could become the decision making leaders of the society they live in.

Jesuit Chennai Mission raised to the status of a Province in October 2019 by Fr Arturo Sosa, S.J., Superior General and Fr L. Jebamalai Irudayaraj, S.J., was appointed as its Provincial on Nov.27, 2019. Fr Jebamalai Irudayaraj assumed office of Provincial on Dec.28, 2019 in a jubilant celebration at Loyola College, Chennai. Fr Provincial is the chairman of Loyola College, Mettala.

OUR COLLEGE: LOYOLA COLLEGE, METTALA

Loyola College, Mettala, is a minority Catholic Co-Educational Institution. Affiliated to the Periyar University, Salem, it is one of the Higher Educational Institutions run by the Jesuits of Chennai Province. The other Institutions in Chennai Province are Loyola College (Autonomous), Chennai, Loyola College of Education, Chennai, Loyola-ICAM College of Engineering Technology (LICET), Chennai, Loyola Institute of Business Administration (LIBA), Chennai and Loyola College, Vettavalam, All these institutions under the chairmanship of the Provincial of the Jesuit Chennai Province follow a common policy for admissions, appointments and administration.

As a minority Institution, Loyola College caters primarily to the formation of Catholic students. However, it keeps its portals open to any student without discrimination on the basis of caste and creed. The College emblem with the motto 'Let your light shine' (*Luceat Lux Vestra*) brings lights of hope and liberation to others.

FOUNDATION

Rev. Fr. Gunasekaran Rajaiah, S.J., and a band of dedicated Jesuits came over to Salem Diocese at the invitation of the Most Rev. Dr. Singaroyan, Bishop of Salem, to open a Catholic College for young men and women in the Diocese of

Salem. Rev. Fr Sebastiraj, Provincial and Rev. Fr. Jebamalai Irudayaraj, Mission Superior, took all necessary initiative to start an Arts and Science Co-Education College. The foundation stone was laid on 23rd November 2014. The college started functioning in July 2015 with 75 students on the rolls in the undergraduate courses of Mathematics, Physics, Computer Science, Commerce and English Literature.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The prime objective of Loyola College, Mettala, is to provide university education to the poor, Dalits, Tribals and other marginalized sections of the Society. The College aims at training young men and women to become leaders and to serve their fellowmen with justice, truth and love. It is expected that this training would play a vital role in bringing about the desired change for the betterment of the people of our country, more particularly the poor and the marginalized sections of the Society.

COLLEGE EMBLEM



The coat of arms of the college consists of a shield divided into four quarters with a torch and an open book motif. The crest is the monogram and seal of the Society of Jesus : IHS (iota-eta-sigma), being the first three letters in Greek of the name JESUS. The crest is in yellow, a colour that represents sunshine, joy and happiness.

The laurel leaves above the crest do stand for victory and prosperity. The open book represents wisdom and other forms of intellectual information and the burning torch symbolizes enlightenment. These are the fundamental tenets of the education imparted in this College which challenges the students to live up to the motto of the College : Let your light shine (Matthew 5:16) by their learning and good example so that they may become beacon of light and hope.

EXAMINATION SYSTEM

There are two components in the evaluation and assessment of a student, namely Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Semester Examination (SE). The CIA will take place during the course of the semester and the SE shall be conducted at the end of each semester. i.e., the Odd Semester in November-December and the Even Semester in April-May.

CONTINUOUS INTERNAL ASSESSMENT

- ✓ The component and actual conduct of CIA are entrusted to the respective Departments.
- ✓ The maximum marks for CIA is 25 for UG Courses.
- ✓ Two written tests are conducted centrally and the average is taken. In case a student is absent for a valid reason, another test may be conducted at the discretion of the Principal.
- ✓ There is no provision for improvement of CIA.
- ✓ Attendance marks are to be given for each paper for UG.

EXAMINATIONS

1. Students should enter the exam hall at the stroke of first bell. No one can enter the hall 30 minutes after the commencement of test or examination.
2. No student will be allowed to leave the examination hall within two hours after the commencement of the examination.
3. Students are prohibited from bringing/carrying into the Examination hall any book or portion of a book, manuscript or any matter of any description. Any communication with another is subject to severe punishment.
4. No paper other than the question paper should be taken out of the examination hall.
5. Students indulging in malpractice will be dealt with as per the directives of the State Government and Periyar University.

RULES REGARDING WRITING ARREARS

Every Semester, two or three weeks prior to the date of submission of semester exam applications, the list of courses offered by the Department in that semester will be published in the departments. Students are advised to apply for those courses.

All the students are required to sign the Continuous Internal Assessment Mark sheets. Requests for correction in C.I.A. marks after the date for signing will not be entertained.

Applications for Semester Examinations are distributed through the Departments. After paying the prescribed fees at the College Office, students should submit the same in the college office on or before the prescribed dates. Applications submitted after the due dates will not be accepted.

Mark sheets for the Semester I, II, III, IV and V will be distributed to the Parents on a notified date normally during Parents-Teachers' Meet. For the VI Semester, the mark sheets will be distributed to the students within one month from the publication of results by the University.

Parents and Students are welcome to meet the concerned authorities for any clarification or grievance.

CERTIFICATE

- A former or present student desiring to obtain a certificate (transfer, age, conduct, bonafide, course completion, etc.) shall apply for it by making a formal written request to the Principal.
- A Certificate will not generally be issued in less than 24 hours' notice.

SCHOLARSHIPS

- Those who wish to apply for or renew scholarship can have the application forms from the College Office. Duly filled in application should reach the College Office on or before the due date.
- Scholarship will be disbursed to students only after the amount is sent to the Principal by the Government. Students should sign the register on receipt of the scholarship.
- All money due to the College will be recovered from the scholarship amount at the time of disbursement. Intimation will be sent to parents and the balance amount if any, will be disbursed only after reply is received from them.
- As per the present rules and regulations of the Government, each scholarship holder is expected to open a saving account in a national bank, wherein the amount will be credited directly by the Government.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Application for admission to the degree courses must be made in the prescribed form. Applicants should have completed 17 years and 6 months on the 15th day of July of the current year.
2. Incomplete application forms will be rejected. All admissions are provisional and subject to the approval of the University.
3. The Principal reserves the right to cancel the admission of the provisionally selected applicants at any time without assigning any reason.

FEES REGULATION

1. Newly admitted students shall pay their fees in full for the first semester at the time of admission.
2. Students who withdraw during the course of the year are required to pay the entire college fees and other fees of that year.
3. Students are permitted to pay the examination fees only after they pay their college fees.
4. Students, who leave the college during the course, cannot claim any portion of the fees paid.

CONDUCT DURING CLASS HOURS

1. When a teacher enters the classroom, all students should stand and greet him/her. They should sit only when they are asked to do so. At the end of the class, students should stand till the teacher leaves the room.
2. During working hours no student is allowed to enter or leave the classroom without the permission of the teacher.
3. During working hours' students should avoid loitering on the verandas and college campus. They should be either in the classroom or in the library as instructed by the class teacher concerned.
4. When in transit from one class to another, students shall walk silently and in an orderly manner.
5. Students attending meetings and other gatherings should conduct themselves with dignity, decorum and maintain silence.

ATTENDANCE

All the students are expected to attend classes every day without fail. However, students can avail leave after obtaining permission from the Vice-Principal on genuine grounds.

1. Daily attendance of students is marked in a register by individual teachers for every period.
2. 80% attendance is a pre-requisite for;
 - I. Permission to write the Semester Exams
 - II. Award of Scholarships of any kind. No exemption will be granted.
3. If a student is absent for one period in a day, he/she will be marked absent for one period only. Two such one periods of absence will be marked as half a day and three such single periods of absence will be marked as full day.

LEAVE LETTER

1. The leave letter must be duly signed by parents/guardian/Hostel Director for genuine reasons well in advance with the prior approval of the HOD.
2. In the case of unforeseen circumstances, a leave letter must be submitted on the first day of return to the class in the proper form.
3. Medical leave letter must be submitted to the HOD with the endorsement of parents and medical certificate.

CODE OF RELATIONSHIP

They (boys and girls) shall respect each other and follow the directions strictly with regard to code of conduct on and off the campus.

CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

1. Student found drunk and using drugs and ragging on the campus will be summarily dismissed from the college.
2. Whether on or off the college campus, students are to conduct themselves decently.
3. Students should not indulge in anti-social activities of any kind.
4. Under the Educational Rules of the Government, the Principal has full power to inflict on students the following punishments: fine, suspension and expulsion from the college.
5. Use of mobile phones by the students is prohibited inside the college campus.
6. All the students shall wear the Identity Card inside the campus and while representing our college for specific programme.
7. Talking in English in the college – premises is mandatory.

DRESS CODE

1. Every student is expected to be in simple and modest formal dress. Girls are expected to be either in saree with sleeved blouse or Chudithar or Salwar Kameez with sleeved long kurtha with thuppatta.
2. Boys are expected to come in Full Pants and Shirt. T-Shirts are not allowed.

DISCIPLINARY RULES

The following are strictly forbidden: any violation of these rules will result in dismissal / suspension from the college:

1. Ragging of any kind and of any magnitude inside / outside the college campus.
2. Any kind of wild noisy and disturbing behavior / celebrations in the campus.
3. Smoking in the campus (including College Hostel).
4. Possession / use of drugs, alcohol or peddling drugs in the campus or anywhere else.
5. Tampering with the contents or misuse of the college identity cards, train / bus identity cards, passes, tickets and tokens.
6. Any kind of misconduct / misbehavior inside / outside the campus (in public places, buses, etc.) or unruly behavior in buses or any kind of annoyance to fellow students will also result in the immediate withdrawal / permanent cancellation of student travel concessions and the scholarships.
7. Malpractices such as cheating, bribing, gambling, copying in tests and exams, giving false declarations, spreading rumors / unfounded accusations / writing / printing / distributing/ displaying unauthorized notices of any kind, etc., in the campus or anywhere else.

8. Inviting / meeting strangers or unauthorized person inside the campus without written permission from the Principal.
9. Causing damage to college / public property.
10. Canvassing the students in any unpermitted manner during Students Council Election.

LIBRARY

1. Absolute silence must be maintained in and around the library.
2. Both the Library & Browsing Centre are open from 8.30 a.m. to 5.30p.m. on all working days and on all Saturdays.
3. While entering the library, all have to register their names.
4. Personal belongings such as Bags, Tiffin-boxes, Notebooks, etc., should be left at the entrance of the library in the place allotted for it.
5. Books are to be borrowed or returned between 9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and 01.15 p.m. to 05.00 p.m.
6. Books are usually lent for a period of two weeks and may be renewed for further period, if those books are not in demand by other students.
7. Students are allowed to take up to three books by using their own ID card.
8. Books should be returned on or before the due date indicated in the issue-slip of the book. An overdue fine of Rs.1 per day will be charged if the book is not returned in time.
9. The Librarian may ask for the return of any book even before the expiry of the due date on demand.
10. Reference Books such as dictionaries, yearbooks, encyclopedia and books labeled as Reference will not be lent.
11. Students are forbidden to make any marking or underlining in books and periodicals.
12. Students are advised to examine and ascertain the conditions of the book at the time of borrowing itself. If there is any damage, it should be immediately brought to the notice of the librarian. Otherwise, the borrower will be held responsible for the damage.
13. If a book is damaged or lost, the cost of replacing it with a new copy along with fine will be recovered from the borrower. If one book in a set of books is damaged or lost, the cost of replacing the whole set will be recovered.
14. All students should produce their identity card at the time of borrowing library books.
15. Students should return books borrowed from the library a week before the last working day of the semester.
16. While borrowing books, the student shall verify the book pocket card and accession number to be the same.
17. Members of the Teaching Faculty can borrow up to five books at a time. They must return the books on or before the last Monday of the respective semester.

ECO-FRIENDLY ZONE

The cleanliness of the college building, furniture and surroundings should be the personal responsibility of every student. It is the duty and responsibility of every student to keep the campus litter free zone.

NOTICE BOARD

1. Students are expected to read the information displayed on the notice boards daily. Ignorance of any notice will not be accepted as an excuse.
2. Students shall neither tamper with the notice put up on the notice boards nor shall they fix any notice on the notice board without the permission of the Principal/ Vice-Principal.

COLLEGE BUS

1. A student using the College bus is expected to be at the bus stop at least ten minutes before the scheduled arrival of the bus. Buses will NOT wait for late comers. The student has to be on the correct side of the arriving bus.
2. Students are allowed to use only their allotted bus and bus stop. No changes will be allowed without prior permission of the Vice-principal (Administration).
3. No student should come near the entry / exit door of the bus until it comes to a complete halt.
4. All students must occupy the seats allotted immediately after boarding their respective buses.
5. Students will sit in the seats allotted to them and are responsible for the area in which they sit at. Any damage inflicted to the bus will be paid for by the student(s) responsible.
6. Tampering with emergency door, windows, bus seats or equipment's is prohibited.
7. Students are strictly not allowed to use of any electronic gadgets like cell phones/mobile phones, I-pods, MP3 players, cameras, etc. inside the bus.
8. Harassment, aggressive behavior, bullying, shouting, fighting, or discriminatory / abusive language or conduct towards the driver / attendant or other people is prohibited.
9. At any case, don't speak with other genders without prior permission of the bus In-charges
10. No student is allowed to enter the driver's cabin in the bus.
11. Consumption of edibles is not permitted in the bus.
12. One-way transport facility is not provided.
13. Parents and Hostlers are not allowed to board the bus for any reason.
14. Parents / guardians of students shall not compel the bus employee to divert any route or change any pick-up or drop-off point allotted at the beginning of the year.
15. The bus route may be altered temporarily if the road condition hinders smooth plying of buses and in such cases students and parents are requested to cooperate with transport department.
16. Indiscipline /misbehavior in the bus or non-payment of bus fees may lead to cancellation of the bus facility for the student. Bus facility is a privilege for any person desiring to avail the facility. The College retains the right to deny the facility to anyone without providing any reason whatsoever.
17. Any indiscipline in the bus will be reported to the College Vice-principal (Administration) for necessary action.
18. The student must wear their ID card at the entry.
19. In case of any misbehavior or violation of the college bus rules, ID cards of the students will be with the Disciplinary committee members till the enquiry is over.

HOSTELS

Loyola Men's Hostel and Loyola Women's Hostel are closely-knit units of Loyola family.

- The main concern of two hostels is character formation coupled with intellectual formation of the students. Our hostel is a home away from home, a temple of learning and a family that has a long living tradition.
- All the inmates are expected to co-operate fully with the Director and Assistant Directors and with one another in achieving these objectives. They should not engage any activity which may be detrimental to realizing these two objectives.

Admission to Hostels

Students will be admitted to the Hostel only after admission to the College and a personal interview with the Hostel Director. The parent of the candidate has to be present at the interview by the Director. Application for admission in the form prescribed should be accompanied by a certificate from the Parish Priest (for Catholics) and from the authorities of the hostel or institution where the student previously resided. Membership of the Hostel is for only one year. Senior students wishing to be readmitted will repeat the same procedure for readmission. Those who have not shown sufficient improvement in their studies and have been failing consistently in the examinations may be denied renewal of membership. Dismissal or suspension of a member from the College will involve automatic dismissal or suspension from the Hostel also.

To Parents

Parents and Guardians are requested to co-operate with college authorities in the formation of good character, in maintaining regularity in attendance and progress in studies of their children/wards. Warning letters will be sent to parents of the students who are irregular in attendance. At the same time, parents and guardians are advised to check in person with HODs/Vice-Principal regarding the attendance of their children/wards. All the parents/guardians have to come with their wards for Parents-Teachers' Meeting.
