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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Society of Jesus is a Christian religious congregation of the Catholic Church whose members are called Jesuits. The names of the members of the Society of Jesus are affixed with an abbreviation, 'SJ' whose meaning is 'Society of Jesus''. Today, more than 16,000 Jesuits serve in 112 countries 180 Jesuits are working at social action centers, schools, and colleges in Jesuit Chennai Province. The Jesuits are well-known for their social involvement through educational and pastoral service, with a vibrant focus on social justice and human rights.

Loyola College of Arts and Science (Co-Ed), Mettala, is a Catholic co-educational institution affiliated with Periyar University, Salem. The College is recognized under Section 2(f) of the University Grants Commission (UGC) Act 1956 and has applied for 12(B). It is one of the Higher Educational Institutions run by the Jesuits of Chennai Province.

The foundation stone was laid on November 23, 2014. The college started functioning in July 2015 with 75 students on the rolls in the undergraduate courses of mathematics, physics, computer science, commerce, and English literature. To date, as of May 31, 2024, the college functions with mathematics, physics, computer science, commerce (general), English literature, Tamil literature, commerce (accounting & finance), chemistry, business administration, and computer applications at the undergraduate level.

The Governing body of the college tries to fulfill the aspirations of the stakeholders and their continuous plan for academic excellence has proved to be a motivating force for self-discovery aimed at touching greater heights of higher education and achieving the mission and vision of the institution

- 3. Preparing students in cutting-edge areas by rigorous persuasion of UGC approved Vocational Courses in the form of ADD-ON Courses as also college sponsored professional courses with an entity external to the college under the supervision of experts with collaboration of reputed training organizations with certification by NSDC in compliance with NSQF.
- 4. Introduction-level Computer Literacy programme for all the 1st and 2nd semester students to ensure basic IT foundation.
- 5. Exposure of the students to actual socio-economic life experience by community outreach programme supplementing theoretical learning is schematically pursued through campaigned encouragement of students for spontaneous involvement.
- 6. Open by hosting University Level Basket Ball Tournaments and other sports and games events to proliferate scope of additional skills along with graduation for potential yet left out learners for mainstream regular UG system.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. Admissions to traditional science courses.
- 2. The college has very limited library resources.
- 3. Transforming lukewarm interest among students to pursue professional courses through their proactive participation.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. Geographical location of the college is easily accessible to the stakeholders of the college. It is only 23 km away from Rasipuram Town and 50 km from Salem City, with high frequency of local transports.
- 2. The College is situated in a peaceful and environmentally enlightened area.
- 3. Faculty exchange programme with reputed educational institution for curricular and allied enrichment of students and teachers are possible.
- 4. Existing E-governance can be expanded by functional inclusion of each

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operational units of college.

5. Communicative skill will be enhanced more by English Language for both academic and professional objective for students and teachers.

Institutional Challenge

- 1. The decrease in student enrollment each year poses a challenge to the administration.
- 2. Being a rural based institution, it is a big venture to compete with city-based colleges.
- 3. In the absence of substantively highly qualified teachers, the college authority is not in a position to apply for affiliation with M.A., M.Sc., M.Com. courses from Periyar University, Salem.
- 4. Conducting interdisciplinary/multi-disciplinary UG programmes to bridge the gap between the core course and discipline.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curricular planning is the mainstay of any higher educational institution. Being an self - financed affiliated undergraduate college, our institution depends, on a large extent on the curricular framework and guidelines provided by Periyar University, Salem. The responsibility of the institution lies in academic planning and implementation of the curriculum by adhering to a flexible academic calendar and arranging and documenting the process of continuous internal assessment of students.

Since 2015, the curriculum offered in the college has expanded in terms of core and add - on courses. Introduction of new courses has led to the growth of the core curriculum. On the other hand, institution maintained academic diversity by introducing new ADD-ON courses which are in tune with the emerging trends and local needs. The introduction of certificate course in Computer Application, Tally ace, Competitive Exams Coaching, Value and Environmental education in last five years has enhanced the add on curriculum base. The new CBCS curriculum introduced by the university was successfully adopted by all academic departments from 2018-19 session. Apart from issues of flexibility and diversity, the college collects the feedback on various curricular aspects from different stakeholders such as the students, alumni and faculty using structured format. Stakeholders' expectations as coded in their feedback is an important input for the initiation and sustenance of quality initiatives in the institution.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- With regard to enrolment of students the rate of enrolment of students 73.42 percentage, which is little encouraging in last Five years for the Institution.
- Regarding students' teacher ratio the institution is having necessary ratio between students and the teachers as to accomplish teaching-learning activities effectively.
- In connection with teaching- learning process the Institution has adopted student's centric methods as holistic approach for providing necessary knowledge and skills to the students. In this connection effective Learning Management System have been implemented synchronizing theory and practical programmes. The Institution is having well organized ICT system for effective teaching- learning

process.

- Faculties of the Institution have attained stipulated academic criteria as being enshrined by UGC and constantly cultivating their academic profile for consistent amelioration.
- The evaluation process and its reforms the CBCS has been adopted by the affiliating university and accordingly the Institution has adopted CBCS for both curriculum and examination system. Continuous evaluation systems of both formative and summative in nature have been adopted in a regular manner to assess the academic progress of students in different disciplines. The faculty members of the Institution are actively engaged in all patterns of examination system.
- In relation to students' performance and learning outcomes according to the affiliating University, each department organises introductory interface session with Students in regard to programme outcomes and course outcomes. Accordingly, the Institution maintains its website to display POs, PSOs and COs in each Course curriculum and activities. In this regard the teachers of the Institution actively participate for total accomplishment of programmes.
- In connection with the student satisfaction survey the Institution organized a half- a- day session to obtain response from the students on curriculum deliverance management and also related to institutional infrastructural facilities in concurrence with NAAC guidelines.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Faculties are given special leaves to finish research works. They are encouraged to go for various professional courses like Orientation, refresher, short-term and faculty development programmes. They are encouraged to take up major & minor research project and funding through government & non-government agencies. Institution has created an eco-system by managing bio-degradable & non bio-degradable wastes in proper marked dustbins for the purpose. Measures are taken for energy conservation. There is a ban on plastic in the campus and surrounding areas. Herbal, medicinal plants are planted in the college garden. Planting of saplings is done on a regular basis by the students on World Earth Day & World Environment Day. Reduce, Reuse & Recycle principle have also been incorporated. Quality research is useful for discipline, society, industry, region and nation. Hence faculties are encouraged to write in different journals, books, articles. They are also evaluated through this method for their promotion purpose, acknowledgement and rewards. Some of the faculties have their contributions in various renowned journals & publications. Extension activities are a must for developing sensitivities towards community issues, Gender disparities and social-in-justice. Lights are thrown on these areas through Seminar & Webinars. Extension & Outreach Programmes are performed through Department wise as well as NSS Unit. Thus, bonding with the society is created through literacy campaign, Thalassemia screening awareness programme, Blood Donation, Aids Awareness Programme, Medical Programme working with a mission like "NOT ME BUT YOU" with the purpose of help serve, reflect and learn.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching and learning. The academic departments are spread across only one building with three floors, which is a technological marvel. The college has excellent infrastructural facilities for the conduct of teaching, learning, and action research activities. The built-up area of the college buildings is 2,45,788.512 sq. ft. out of the total 16,11,720 sq. ft (37 acres) of the campus area, and the available space is optimally utilized for multiple purposes. To provide a good learning atmosphere and exchange of information with modern amenities and comfortable seating arrangements. Five laboratories filled with five different departments, furnished with high-standard furniture, equipment, modern

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gadgets, instruments, and chemicals, are in function, facilitating the laboratory practical and learning processes.

The college is the centre of multiple academic activities that go on campus throughout the academic year. The college leaves no stones unturned in terms of provisions for contemporary electronic teaching-learning aids such as smart boards, webcams, LCD projectors, laptops, computers, printers, and Wi-Fi connectivity.

Being a hub of multiple activities like cultural, sports, gymnasium, yoga, etc., throughout the year, the college has excellent facilities to host them.

The multipurpose open-air auditorium and conference hall are available for cultural activities, such as College festivals, street plays, etc. The college endorses sports among students in a big way, by training them to excel in their respective sports events. This is proved through the sporting record of the college, which is phenomenal. Our college students participate in various inter-college, State, National, and Inter-university competitions for volleyball, basketball, and kabbadi. The management provides generous scholarships and sports kits to deserving sportsmen and women for their remarkable achievements. Volleyball, Basketball and Kabbadi court of international standard size in a time-shared fashion and Special coaches have been appointed to train the students, and they participate in University, State, and National levels. Adequate facilities for chess, carrom, table tennis, etc. are provided. The College provides Diet scholarships and T.A. / D.A. to students who participate in various levels of tournaments. Yogacharyas are invited as experts to give training to the faculty and students.

The institution provides necessary assistance to students to acquire meaningful experiences for learning thus leading to holistic development and progression. Students of the College receive several grants from various schemes under the Government of Tamil Nadu.

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

- The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. Loyola College of Arts & Science is an institution managed by the Roman Catholic Church affiliated with Periyar University, Salem, and adheres to the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university.
- The college has a well-qualified teaching staff. Staff members are appointed as per the State Government, UGC, and affiliated university norms.
- The annual academic calendar is prepared by IQAC, and the same is displayed for teachers and students on the college website and notice boards.
- Meetings are held in each department at the beginning of the academic year to discuss the course distribution for the new academic year. Based on the teachers' expertise and experience, courses are allotted accordingly. Teachers submit their teaching plans before the commencement of classes to the Principal and HoDs.
- A faculty-wise timetable is prepared by the timetable committee. A department-wise practical and theory timetable is prepared to ensure the smooth conduct of lectures and practical sessions.

The college has subscribed to G Suite (Google workspace). ALL THE CLASSROOMS ARE FITTED WITH LCD PROJECTOR AND SCREENS. Each department is provided with SMART ELECTRONIC BOARDS and all the teaching staff were trained how to use it effectively and efficiently.
- Classroom teaching is supplemented with seminars, workshops, guest lectures, group discussions, tutorials, departmental tests, paper presentations, group assignments, educational tours, field trips, industrial visits, project writing, etc. which are well planned for effective delivery of the curriculum.
- IQAC plays an intrinsic role in the implementation of curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities of all departments. IQAC implements a system to ensure syllabus completion through a syllabus completion report at the end of each term/semester.
- An atmosphere of challenge and stimulation is maintained in all academic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities to ensure that the students are well prepared to meet and withstand the variety of challenges that they will inevitably face in various spheres of life.

One of the tenets of the college mission being 'Enabling students to become agents of social transformation by imparting Constitutional Values', Every teacher probes their respective curricula to link issues related to gender, environment and sustainability, human values, and professional ethics to the

syllabus and spends some time in creating awareness on such cross-cutting issues. In addition to this, various co-curricular and extracurricular activities are also organized to superscribe these issues. The integration in the curriculum leads to the creation of awareness among the students regarding issues like gender equality, social justice, human rights, environmental awareness, and professional ethics.

Gender Issues:

The college has conducted various activities/programs on cross-cutting issues to supplement the university curriculum. Group discussion, debate competition, paper presentations on gender roles, feminism, sexual harassment, street plays on domestic violence and violence against women, poster competition on save girl child, female foeticide, cybercrime against women and how to be safe, are some of the activities organized to sensitize the students on gender issues. In addition to these events, Women's Health and Hygiene, Nirbhaya Kanya Abhiyan, and Personality Development and self-protection programs are organized to empower women.

Environment and Sustainability

Several guest lectures on waste management, saving the environment were organized in our college. Field visit to local villages for tree plantation under the college's collaboration with local NGOs is a regular affair. Thousands of saplings are planted by our students every year. The college has also taken the initiative to sensitize the students on environmental concerns by promoting paper bags instead of plastic bags. The students were trained for making handmade paper bags. The college by all means takes efforts to keep the campus plastic-free. The college observes **Zero Vehicle Day in its efforts to reduce pollution.** The college has taken major initiatives in e-waste management. One week e-waste collection drive was organized in college. A total of 250 kg of E-waste was collected and donated to NGOs to recycle the E-waste. Every year the college organizes a rally for encouraging cleanliness and hygiene during the time of New Year

Human values and Professional Ethics

Apart from the curriculum, the college offers an autonomous course in International Relations and Universal Human Values. Regular visits to orphanages, old-age homes, hospitals, etc., and projects like 'Wall of kindness' are undertaken by the college as a social initiative to sensitize students about human values and their duties towards the deprived section of society. Workshops on "Plagiarism" were conducted to familiarise the staff about professional ethics. Loyola College is resolved to grow the right frame of mind, required abilities, and impart leading knowledge by making teaching-learning a two-way process and student-centric. The students are encouraged to participate in the teaching-learning activities to develop their holistic personalities and enhance their employability and entrepreneurship skills. Transacting the curriculum through

these approaches makes the whole procedure thought-provoking and innovative. Following are some of the strategies adopted by faculty members during their content delivery:

Experiential Learning

Since experiential learning is the process of learning through experience enabling students to learn in a more practical manner, the teachers adopt skill-based methods for introduction, demonstration, citing examples, explaining, elaborating, and concluding the chosen topics with the following activities: To complement classroom learning with real-life or first-hand experiences the theories learned in the classroom are augmented through industrial visits, field trips, visits to places of historical and environmental interest, and through a practicum in their respective labs. There are well-equipped laboratories with necessary equipment where students perform experiments that are in tune with the theory syllabi. Intercollegiate events like **COMFEST**, **UNISON**, **MAGNUM**, **IGNITE** is organized every year where the students from various other colleges participate and compete.

Participative Learning

This is the best student-centric learning method, in which students play an active role during classes that are interactive in nature. This leads to learning from peers and makes education interesting and enjoyable. The activity-based learning includes: Conducting guest lectures, Interdepartmental academic-related programs, and Intercollegiate/district/state level competitions to make every student come out of his/her comfort zone and experience the larger competitive world. 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

The college has initiated a continuous and comprehensive internal evaluation process in accordance with the norms and guidelines of Periyar University, Salem. The following measures adopted by the institution guarantee that the internal assessment is transparent and robust:

An examination committee/department coordinates the internal and external examination activities and communicates about them to students, teachers, and administrative staff. Evaluation methods and examination schedules are made available on the college notice boards and college websites.

Internal assessment is done through formative and summative assessment systems. The formative assessment comprises conducting class tests, multiple-choice tests, quizzes, oral examinations, assignments, projects, poster presentations, open-book tests, library assignments, projects, etc. The summative assessment system comprises term-end exams and university examinations. The teachers' interaction with the students during practical sessions and lectures enables the teacher to evaluate the performance of the student and identify the learning gaps, if any. The identified problem areas are addressed and remedial action is initiated. This helps the students identify their strengths and weaknesses and work on problem areas. Students' performance in assignments, seminars, and orals/practicals is reflected in their cumulative scores. All the teachers of concerned subjects submit term-end examination question papers prepared as per the University guidelines through the Head of the Department to the examination committee. The exam is conducted as per the faculty-wise common schedule and supervised by the junior and senior supervisors. Changes in schedules, patterns, and methods, if any, are immediately notified to the students through notice boards and also through classroom briefing by the concerned subject teachers. The components of practical examinations include Record Maintenance and Viva-voce, which carry different weights for each program. The answer sheets are shown to students after evaluation for their information, which provides transparency and accountability in the evaluation process. Student grievances are taken care of and are redressed in a timely manner. Students are free to interact with the teachers and to resolve grievances, if any, regarding the assessment. Marks lists of the students are prepared after the evaluation and documented for further clarifications. Online internal marks are submitted to the university through teacher's login accounts on the university's internal examination portal. If absence in the internal examination is due to genuine reasons, students are provided with an opportunity for supplementary/improvement examinations if they fail to attend or do not perform well in the scheduled exam.

Continuous and comprehensive internal evaluation is undertaken as per the University rules. The college appoints an internal squad for the prevention of malpractices in the Internal Examination. Mobile phone in the examination hall are strictly prohibited. CCTV cameras are installed in the examination halls and in selected classrooms to ensure transparency of the examination process.

Mass Awareness Program, Survey and Registration camp

NSS team organized a camp with the Namakkal District Legal Service Authority (NDLSA) to enroll inhabitants of Ayilpatty village in various Government programs. Aadhar enrolment was also organized for Ayilpatty villagers . A 50 Km walkathon was organised by the NSS team in collaboration with a local NGO. India Green and Wild awareness rally was also held.

The seminar halls are upgraded from time to time in tune with the latest technology available, which makes them an ideal place for hosting seminars, workshops, conferences, meetings, and other events.

Technology-enabled learning spaces

The college leaves no stone unturned in terms of provisions for contemporary electronic teaching-learning aids such as smart boards, webcams, LCD projectors, laptops, computers, printers, and Wi-Fi connectivity.

Learning Spaces

Fifteen dedicated computers with printers and scanners attached are reserved for staff and students where internet access is free and enrolment of staff and students in NLIST, NDLI, SWAYAM, and NPTEL is done.

Open-Air Auditorium

The open-air auditorium is the place for entertainment and celebrations. Apart from the conference hall and seminar halls, there is a separate Open-air auditorium where activities such as Celebration of Independence Day, Republic Day, Annual Prize Distribution, Graduation/Convocation, Book Exhibitions, and other programs are held.

The institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoors and outdoors), and a yoga centre.

Being a hub of multiple activities like cultural, sports, and yoga throughout the year, the college has excellent facilities to host them.

Cultural activities The multipurpose open-air auditorium and conference hall are available for cultural activities, where practice sessions of cultural events like college festivals, street plays, etc. are conducted. These facilities provided by the college help in promoting cultural and traditional values amongst the students through the organization of events such as traditional days, inter-college cultural events and competition, etc., in addition to boosting their organizational skills.

The Knowledge Resource Centre (Library) is the nerve center of our institution and indeed our pride with nearly one lakh volumes some of which are rare collections. Abundant books, journals, and periodicals are added from time to time to the already existing reference material in the Knowledge Resource Centre. Book Bank facility is made available for the students through the Centre. The college subscribes to the NLIST database, having both in-house and remote access, which is a password-based subscription. The database contains 8,788 Books and 5 journals. The library is automated using NIRMALS software. Partial bibliographic data of all library collections are added to the database. Bar coding technology is also used for library operations. i.e. issue/return, and for reading room attendance. There are ten online terminals placed for the use of students and OPAC search.

Reading room facilities with day and night library is a boon to the students especially during the period of examination. Knowledge Resource Centre orientation program, 'Know your Library' is organized every year for the students regarding the use of library resources by conducting open information sessions. Spacious reading hall for students inclusive of OPAC terminals for access to catalogue and separate enclosures for library administrative staff and faculty members ensure efficient utilization of the available resources.

Hardware Up-gradation: Hardware up-gradation is being carried out regularly, as per requirements of individual departments. Systems have been replaced with new models with advanced configurations.

Software Up-gradation: The college has purchased the licensed software, viz., MS Office and Windows (version 7/8/10) 3. Oracle 4. Net Protector Antivirus 5. Tally ERP 6. UNIX Antivirus is deployed through a centralized server and updated annually.NP/AV was purchased in 2017 for 3 years and was subsequently renewed. Three server antivirus programs and two admin consoles are available for upgrade. The Operating system is updated in a phased manner.

LAN Facility: LAN facility is available for students and teachers. Internet browsing facility is available on all computers in Department of computer science, Knowledge Resource Center, administrative office and account section. NIRMALS ERP software is used for different modules.

Wi-Fi Campus: Entire college campus is connected with a WI-Fi facility. There are 14 (8 Port), 1 (16-port), and 12 (Port) switches are used. BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF LOYOLA:

The college is governed by the **BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF LOYOLA-METTALA REGISTERED SOCIETY** as the overall head. The **GOVERNING BODY of the College** serves as an interface between the college and the managing board.: The College has a well-functioning organisational structure managed and administered by the **BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF LOYOLA-METTALA REGISTERED SOCIETY**. It recommends strategic plans that can be adopted in matters like infrastructural development, enhancement of quality in teaching-learning process, promotion of research and healthy practices.

The Governing Body: At the college level, the CDC is an apex body with regard to the matters in policy making and acts a link between the Governing Council and the College comprising of representation from the Governing Council, Principal, Vice-Principals, senior faculty members, non-teaching staff, alumni and academicians from the society at large.

Principal: The Principal being the executive head of the institution is entrusted with the responsibility of managing the day-to-day affairs of the college to implements the directives of the Governing Body through in accordance with the norms and guidelines stipulated by the government and other regulatory agencies. The Principal is supported by three wings: Academic Wing, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) and Administrative Wing.

Academic Wing: Under the Academic wing, the Principal is assisted by Vice-Principals who are followed by the Heads of the departments and all other faculty members.

- 1. **Vice-Principals**: They work in an advisory capacity to the Principal and also coordinate academic and administrative activities of the college.
- 2.**HODs:** The Heads of Department monitor their respective departmental activities and performances including faculty members and non-teaching staff.
- 3.**Library Advisory Committee (LAC):** The LAC guides the Librarian in related issues who is assisted by Library support staff.
- 4.**Examination Committee:** All examination related issues are handled by College Examination Officer (CEO) with the assistance of examination committee and the clerical/menial staff.
- 5. **Physical Aesthetics Department:** The Physical Aesthetics Department is headed by Physical Director who conducts sports and many other activities with the assistance of non-teaching staff.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) The IQAC functions as a pivot to undertake all the critical planning, monitoring and execution of quality assurance measures.

Administrative Wing: Principal is assisted by the Registrar who operates with the support of the Office Superintendent, Accountants, clerks and menial staff.

Service Rules and Recruitment: The college follows the rules and regulations laid down by Periyar University, Salem, UGC and Government of Tamil Nadu for the recruitment of staff (teaching and non-teaching), service conditions and rules.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college conducts Internal and External audits regularly. It has appropriate mechanism to ensure that financial records and statements are shown in true and fair manner as required by the Accounting standards and prevailing laws.

Internal Audit:

Internal audit is a continuous process which ensues after each and every financial transaction. The Internal Auditor is appointed by the parent Institution in Mettala. Internal audit takes place at two levels namely receipts and payment. The receipts of the fees collected from the students are checked by the auditor. The official letters, official funds collected, and bank statements are checked by the internal auditor. Donation receipts are also checked by the auditor. At payment level the account of the purchase bills is entered in the tally system, vouchers are created which come under various ledgers. The payment vouchers are verified by the Accountant, signed by the Principal and authorized Management signatories. Thereafter cheques are issued to the concerned parties. This is again verified and checked by the tally

system.

Salary of staff, deductions, Tax deducted at Source (TDS) is verified by the Internal Auditor.

External Audit:

The external audit takes place after the completion of financial year. The Chartered Accountant, who works as an External auditor is appointed by the parent institution Mettala. The audit program goes on for 15 to 30 days during the month of May/June. The nature of the payment is categorized into 1) Revenue Expenditure 2) Capital Expenditure The bills and vouchers of the revenue expenditure is checked. The vouchers and proper record with the concerned Department of the capital expenditure is also checked and verified. The audited statements and accounts are submitted to the Governing Body/Board of Management who merged these with other sister concern educational institutions and submit it to the Government authorities including the Charity Commissioner for Tamil Nadu State, Chennai. The Income Tax Returns are also filed with the Income Tax Office, Chennai. The college also prepare various returns based on annual accounts to other government offices like Professional Tax Returns, Provident Fund Returns, Returns for determination of amount to be paid to Gratuity Accounts and TDS returns. The Audited Accounts Statements of the funds received from BCUD under the Student Welfare scheme and for organizing seminars are re-audited by the University.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes. It reviews teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and records the incremental improvement in various activities

Response:

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) was first constituted in the college in 2022 to develop awareness for consistent quality improvement in the overall performance (academic and administration) by focusing on strategies for quality enhancement and its implementation. The practices institutionalized by the IQAC are:

Practice 1: Workshop on NAAC's Criteria and the responsibilities of the stakeholders

Starting from 2022 till this year 2024 Dr. Michael Anjello Jothi Rajan, Associate Professor of Physics, (Retd.), Tamil Nadu Government Aided Colleges Educational Services, Chennai has been delivering hands on training classes to enlighten the management, staff, students and stake holders about the developments in Higher Education in UNO and in the Indian Educational Scenario especially the history of NAAC and the expectations of the NAAC of the HEIs. 3. Gender Audit:

By forming various committees like Anti-ragging, Internal Complaints, and Sexual Harassment Prevention; at the same time providing adequate facilities to girls, gender equality is kept upright in the college. The following initiatives have been undertaken:

- a. Independent study room in the library provides girl students undistracted study time.
- b. There is adequate space in the Ladies Common Room and silence is maintained for girls to study. Wash room provision has also been made for girls.
- c. Girls' washrooms are situated at two different places in the college with ample water supply and proper maintenance.
- d. Water coolers and water purifiers have been provided for girls.
- e. There is a separate section in the canteen for girls so that they can comfortably consume their own food or canteen food.
- f. A separate world class basketball Court has been built exclusively for girl students.

The college has established a number of committees to aid girl students and ladies staff. These committees include:

- 1. Anti-Ragging Committee: As the college forms a constituent part of the Periyar University, Salem, some of its responsibilities are shared and covered by joint arrangements. The college publishes its regulations in the prospectus. Ragging is a criminal offence and the students in distress owing to ragging related incidents can approach the Committee.
- 2. Discipline Committee: The college publishes its regulations in the prospectus. The college has formed a Discipline Committee. The students in distress owing to Discipline related incidents can assess the committee.
- 3. Women's Forum: In the effort to make Loyola College, a strong kernel of gender sensitization, the Women's Forum was constituted in December of 2019. It has been organizing various skill enhancement, academic, technical, medical, cultural and social events for the upliftment of women and promotion of

the importance of gender equality in society through the College students.

- 4. The NCC unit for girls provides a suitable environment for taking up a career in the armed forces. The girls are trained and motivated for leadership in all walks of life.
- 5. Our institute has NSS to sensitize students towards societal issues and community services, activities of which are mainly carried out by the students. The NSS unit for girls provides a suitable environment for taking up a career in the social services. The girls are trained and motivated for all kinds of social work in the field. They are motivated to serve the society.
- 6. Administrative Committees and Girl Students Representative: Becoming a student representative enables the student to develop and strengthen leadership skills, connect with various internal and external issues and problems, assist fellow students, share experiences, and participate in college events for the administrative development.
- 7. 4. The Practice

ENGLISH

During the first year of the degree course all the students undergo training in increasing their vocabulary horizon, usage of proper grammar, writing structured sentences, essay writing and good spoken English. After COVID - 19 handwriting sessions were practiced to improve handwriting in Tamil as well as English.

COMPETITIVE EXAMS

During the second year of the degree course all the students undergo rigorous training programmes in the preparation of materials for facing competitive examinations for government jobs as wells as private jobs for 90 hours in the odd semester and 90 hours during the even semester. Experts in this field are invited to handle these classes. Some of the exams they write are Tamil Nadu Public Service Commission, Union Public Service Commission, Staff Selection Commission, Tata Recruitment Drive, Banking Services Recruitment Board, Steel Authority of India Limited.

COMPUTER AND INTERNET COMPETENCY

If a person is unaware of the usages of computers and internet then he/she is known as computer and internet illiterate. In this culture of digital literacy students are encouraged to learn about computers and internet during the third year of their degree course. A minimum of five certificate courses (ADD-ON COURSES) are offered according to the requirement of the various courses.
